

# Hello, Hello, Is Anyone Out There?

## (Getting the Most From Internet Message Boards & Mailing Lists)

*Internet Message Boards and Mailing Lists help you connect with other people researching the same family lines. Some researchers will **only** be found through message boards and mailing lists, because they choose to never post their databases online. In addition, the archives can be a valuable source of information not found elsewhere on the internet.*

### Both Message Boards and Mailing Lists:

- ▶ Primarily focus on surname or locality
- ▶ Have a variety of special interest areas such as religions, ethnic groups, and wars
- ▶ Archive their postings online and are searchable
- ▶ Take a similar search strategy, but each site has its own quirks you'll get familiar with as you experiment and work with the site.

### The Difference?

Message Board: A message is posted right to an internet site

Mailing List: A message is emailed to everyone who subscribes to a list

*Consider privacy: Do you want your email address posted right to the internet or do you feel more comfortable if it is encrypted? Not having it encrypted = spam. So, consider having an alternate email address you can use for this.*

## Posting a Message:

### Subject Line – Who? Where? When?

- ▶ Limited by space to get your point across
- ▶ Most boards need the time period
- ▶ Locality boards usually don't need a where, but surname boards do.



Examples: James & Mary Blair/Morgan County, IN 1830 [surname board]  
Col. John Blair/Hawins County, TN 1788 [surname board]  
BLAIR, Col. John 1788 [locality board]  
NELSONS IN STOCKBRIDGE TOWNSHIP: 1700s [locality board]

### Body of the Message – More details (but not too many)

- ▶ Give enough info to let people know you have good info.
- ▶ Don't give so much info that people don't need to contact you for more.
- ▶ If they don't contact you, you don't get to collaborate and get more info from them.
- ▶ Look through other postings. What do you think is effective? Did they get answers?
